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Transportation Guide

Getting to Milano

There are three airports in the city: Malpensa (MXP), Linate (LIN), and Bergamo Orio al Serio (BGY). Domestic and international connections are also available from main train stations, like Milan's Central Station (Milano Centrale).

Getting to Milano: by plane

Milan's airports provide frequent domestic and international connections. All airports have tourist information offices, car rental services, shops, and restaurants.

- [Milano Malpensa airport](#) has two terminals and is well connected to the city. To reach Milan from the airport get on [Malpensa Express train](#) (the fastest way) or on a [bus](#). Alternatively, you can rent a car and drive. On average, it'll take you around 1 hour to arrive in Milan.

- [Milano Linate](#) airport is closer to the city and is connected by the Blue Metro line (underground line M5) and by the bus no. 73 (Via Gonzaga/Duomo). Moreover, private shuttle buses connect the airport to the city's Central Railway Station (Stazione Centrale) and Malpensa airport.

Taxi cabs are also available at the Arrivals (please, take the official taxis that are located outside the Arrivals).

- [Orio al Serio](#), near the city of Bergamo, is around an hour away from Milan and is also well connected to the city center by buses.

Getting to Milano: by train

- [Trenord](#)
Trenord manages the suburban and regional train service, the Malpensa Express airport connection service, and the cross-border Lombardy-Canton Ticino (Switzerland) service through the Swiss company TILO.

The company offers several regional and national routes, as well as high-speed international routes toward France, Switzerland, Germany and Austria.

Getting around in Milano: public transport

Milan has 5 metro (underground) lines: M1 Rossa (Red), M2 Verde (Green), M3 Gialla (Yellow), M5 Lilla (Purple), and M4 Blu (Blue – still partially under construction). Metros operating hours: M1, M2 and M3 from around 05.30 AM to around 12.30 AM, M5 from 5.40 AM to midnight.

You can also use [Passante Ferroviario](#) (suburban train) to move around Milan.

Trains, buses, and trams in the city are managed by [ATM](#).

Public transport stops near Politecnico main Campus

- The closest metro stop is "Piola" on the green line (M2). The Leonardo Campus is just a 2-minute walk from this metro station.
- Buses 90 and 91 stop near "Piola" square. The Leonardo Campus is a 6-minute walk from these stops.
- Light rail (Tram) 19 and 33 stop on Via Bonardi, in front of the Leonardo Campus entrance.

Tickets

Tickets cannot be used by more than one person at a time. All tickets can be used on buses, trams, underground lines, and on the city tracks of the suburban trains. Tickets are sold in bars, newspaper stands, and tobacco shops in Metro stations, or can be bought at automatic ticketing machines in Metro stations. Also, you can use the ATM mobile pass (<https://www.atm.it/en/ViaggiaConNoi/Pages/ATMMobile.aspx>) or your credit card (https://www.atm.it/en/ViaggiaConNoi/Pages/contactless_cards_metro.aspx)

- Single ticket, valid for 90 minutes € 2.20
- 24-hour pass € 7.60
- Pass for 3 consecutive days € 13.00
- 10-ticket pass € 19.50

Special tickets

- If you are planning to visit locations surrounding Milan, you can buy *lo Viaggio Ovunque* in Lombardia travel card (<https://www.trenord.it/en/tickets/travel-titles/tickets/>): it is an integrated ticket for 1, 2, 3 or 7 days to travel on all public transport in Milan plus all over Lombardy, including ferries serving the lakes.

Getting around in Milano: bike sharing

- **BikeMi** service by ATM and Milan Municipality allows bike rental via App and Online (pre-paid cards not accepted).
- BikeMi offers traditional bikes, pedal-assistance bikes, and child-seat bikes.
- Bike rental is allowed from 16 y/os onwards and operates from 06.00 AM to midnight.

Getting around in Milan: car sharing

- Several companies offer car sharing services (electric and petrol). Depending on the company, you can access services with fixed pick-up and drop-off stations or free-floating parking mode. When using these services, parking on blue and yellow stripes and access to the city's **Area C** are free.
